Why do people seek Spiritual Direction?

Sometimes, situations, events or attitudes from the past may be blocking an individual's openness to experiencing God's love.

The spiritual direction encounter allows one to gently and prayerfully explore these potential blocks, and discover an open path to new freedom.

The role of the spiritual director is like that of a midwife, who assists the other in the process of giving birth to that which is seeking expression in the other's life. The whole of the spiritual life is really that of giving birth to Christ in our lives.

Spiritual direction is *not* a situation of an expert and learner, or doctor and patient. The spiritual director is a resource, rather than an authority. It is not counseling, problem-solving, advice giving, tutoring in the faith, or theological debate.

What might you experience with Spiritual Direction?

- Every interaction with a spiritual director is unique, but you will begin only when you are ready. The process is gentle, informal, and unscripted. Your time spent with your spiritual director is completely about you and for you.
- Spiritual direction is not counseling or psychotherapy.
- You will be encouraged to take small, simple steps. You may be asked questions that invite you to stretch and grow.
- You will be offered the gift of hospitality in an open and safe physical and spiritual place.

Is Spiritual Direction right for you?

- Are you experiencing a new sense of God in your life?
- Are you feeling distant from God?
- Are you facing an important decision of discernment?
- Are you facing a change or transition in your life?
- Are you feeling fragmented, disjointed, outof-touch, fearful, angry?
- Are you overly-involved in (or find yourself disinterested by) things that once brought joy?
- Is your faith and ministry feeling more burdensome than life-giving?



Individuals generally see a spiritual director about once a month for one hour, although weekly meetings for a predetermined time may also be an option. Through spiritual direction, we seek to experience God's love and deeply feel our own love for God in return.
